ELECTION SEASON HEATS UP

Primary season is now underway, giving voters their chance to choose the candidates who will run in November elections. This year, 2018, is not an ordinary midterm-election year. What is at stake is control of Congress and statehouses across our deeply divided nation for the second half of President Trump's first term of office.

The balance of power in both houses of Congress, as well as in many state legislatures and governorships, will be decided in November. However, in order to get on a ballot in November, a candidate must first win in a primary election. These 2018 midterm elections are probably the most important in many years and may well determine whether Republicans, and President Trump especially, will be able to get their top priorities through Congress. It is critically important for voters to scrutinize candidates' positions on topics of major importance. For seniors, these include Social Security, Medicare, cost of prescription drugs, to name a few.

In the last midterm election in 2014, the largest single voting bloc was citizens over age 60, accounting for 39.4% of all voters. Candidates need to listen to and engage with this bloc, now more informed than ever.

• All 435 seats in the House of Representatives are up for election. Currently, Republicans control the House by a margin of 238 to 193 (with four vacancies)

• Of the 100 U.S. Senate seats, 35 are up for election. Republicans now control the Senate, 51 to 49.

• Governors will be chosen is 36 states. Currently there are 26 governorships held by Republicans, nine by Democrats, and one by an independent.

• Thousands of state-level senators and representatives will be voted into or out of office as well. State leaders elected this fall will influence how district lines are drawn for the U.S. House and state legislatures after the Census of 2020.

These facts depict just how important the midterm

elections are. Do your homework, listen to what candidates have to say, and make your choices wisely. The Maryland primary election is June 26. Every single vote counts, make sure your voice is heard!

LEGISLATIVE David Carmack (240-578-4965)

As reported in an earlier edition of THE KEY NOTES, the President in his budget for fiscal 2019 recommended a pay freeze for federal employees for 2019 and a cut in earned federal pay and benefits. Unless Congress opposes the President's pay freeze for federal employees, it will happen. His other proposals require Congressional approval. Early in May, Office of

Personnel Management Director, Jeff Pon, sent a letter to Congress in support of the President's budget proposal to cut earned federal pay and benefits. Pon urged Congress to eliminate the FERS annuity, to change the way federal annuities are calculated by basing pensions on the average highest five years of pay instead of the highest three years (the current rule), to increase FERS employee contributions to their annuities with no corresponding increase in benefits, and to reduce or eliminate cost-of-living adjustments (COLAs) for current and future retirees. Under the last proposal, FERS retirees COLAs would be eliminated and Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) COLAs would be reduced by 0.5 percent. NARFE urges its members to contact their senators and representatives to oppose the changes as they affect both current federal employees and retired federal employees.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT Dennis Vernon (301-694-8003)

Please welcome David Fiske and Michaela Saccoccio who have transferred to our chapter from another NARFE chapter. Welcome back, Karen Ann Croyle-Fischer and Carl Thayer who have their membership reinstated. Two members have had their membership dropped by NARFE Headquarters for non-renewal and they are: David Howell and John F. Kennedy (what a wonderful name to have). If you pay your national dues of \$40 and your chapter dues of \$9, your membership will be reinstated.

One of the derivative benefits of chapter membership is receiving The Key Notes Newsletter containing useful information such as pending legislative actions that may impact our federal benefits, as well as, NARFE and chapter activities.
